Marguerite, like many of the others, was ready to learn new crafts and new techniques since her weaving and knitting projects had become a bit tedious and dull in the resent days and months. There was a class offered that especially caught her interest as it was in a language not familiar to her at all, the class was taught by Baroness Nest and it was called "Kumihimo", this very foreign word was somewhat enticing.

Kumihimo it turns out is some kind of hand braiding technique done by using a round wheel that has a hole in the middle, and notches all along the outside. First one had to prepare eight arm lengths of yarn using two dif-

ferent colors, those strings of yarn were then knotted together and put through the whole in the middle of the wheel with a weight attached to them. The strings were then separated on the wheel with two on top, to on each side and two on the bottom with the two colors off set from one another. After the wheel was set up, all one had to do, was moving one string down, one string up and turn the wheel. Minutes into this process one could see that a two color cord was being formed with the colors spiraling around each other. It was clear that all pupils had thoroughly enjoyed learning this "kumihimo" technique because throughout the afternoon one or the other could be found somewhere in the hall

still working on their new braiding projects.




Immediately after that class there was another class held by Lady Eleina, she presented the many hats she had fabricated over many years, it was fascinating and all were amazed at how much work seems to go into those "bonnets" they do look very lovely and decorative. Some of the patterns used and taught in this class seemed easy enough and Margurite and her new friends planned to go home and try their skills at making

such a hat, they knew they had plenty of old dresses or extra fabric at hand.

Lady Sile was next with her class on "sprang" many of the newcomers attended. Marguerite decided to leave and find out about the day board since she was getting a little hungry. The kitchen crew must have been hard at work, a wonderful day board was set up in the hall. She took a small break to

eat and converse with old friends she had not seen in many months. The men at arms were entering the hall to warm up their sore bodies and take in some food and drink.



After lunch there was one more class on the history of the recorder with a short follow up on actually playing the instrument. The teacher was Lord Rufus. The class was small and an enjoyable time was had with

little mistress Evelyn helping her mother play the recorder. Even one of the men at arms participated and he easily picked up on the notes and melodies and he visible become more and more relaxed after all the fighting in the cold.

The youngest members of the group had been kept busy with some kind of scavenger hunt, where they had to find answers to many questions which were often challenging and required a bit of team work and encouragement and help by the adults. Their eager excited faces showed just how much fun was had.

A glimpse through the frosted windows provided proof that the storm grew fiercer by the minute and it was decided that the feast and court would be held at a much earlier time, the group still had to travel back home the same day. This decision did not affect or diminish the celebration of the new champions of the tournament of the ice weasel, great honor was bestowed on them and many goblets were charged to toast our King and Queen, our Baron and Baroness and the days Champions throughout the delicious feast.

The meal shared by all was outstanding, the bread served with the delicious butters and it was crusty and warm, the Icelandic cod was so fresh it tasted as though the fish had freshly jumped out of the sea just before it was served. The meat pies, always one of Marguerites favorites, did not disappoint either. She would have loved to enjoy every last bite of that special meal. She knew that the savory sausage and the chocolate cake served with fresh fruit, the finale of that wonderful meal, were going to be left for the others to enjoy and that Johannes and her would not taste any of it.

The SCAdian Chef The Leftover Bread Dilemma

It's customary in Smoking Rocks, at the end of an event, to put out the leftovers from feast and dayboard and let people bring home what they want. It's a great way to keep tons of food from going to waste and it's also a terrific way for starving artists and impoverished scholars to supplement their diets between wealthy patrons and commissions for Royal portraits.

When you're lucky enough have access to professional bakers in the barony (many thanks again to our Richard Leviathan), a free supply of fabulous bread is a very welcome addition to the dayboard or feast. In fact, we get so much bread that even after the peasants' collective has taken what they desire, we still have several loaves left over.

What to do with all that extra bready goodness? You could make medieval gingerbread – a la Forme of Cury (see http://www.godecookery.com/ ginger/ginger.htm for the recipe), as the recipe is best when using fresh breadcrumbs and not the dry and sandy breadcrumbs you usually find in stores). It's a fun activity for children, too, as it can be molded like play dough. A sweet, sticky, honeyed, messy play dough. Hmmm, perhaps another day...

Let me suggest a hot and tasty dish of bread pudding! Ugh, bread pudding, you say? Fear not, gentle reader! This isn't your typical cold and runny bread pudding topped off with gaseous faux-whipped cream that sputters in all directions, not the bread pudding that you find at old, dimly-lit, family -style restaurants with funky smelling carpets and cranky patrons reminding you that you better not forget the early bird special is supposed to come with a choice of rainbow sherbet or congealed bread pudding. (Forgive me -I was scarred by my experience as a serving wench at such an establishment for years while I was still a penurious academic. Pray, give me a moment to compose myself.)

No, cold and congealed bread pudding would be a waste of hale and hearty SCAdian bread! I first started experimenting with bread pudding using a recipe that I purloined from a pair of Acadian exiles who run a tavern called the "Bon Ton Café". I will not publish it here, as rightfully one must travel to the Barony of Axemoor in the Kingdom of Gleann Abhann to sample it in its native surroundings (or you can make it at home using this receipt: http://www.simplyrecipes.com/recipes/bread_pudding) but suffice it to say that it requires generous amounts of use beatha, preferably distilled in some inaccessible, moonlit glen guarded by local farmers. To the Smoking Bridge Guild of Libation Brewers – stat!

Of course, if you'd like to be more authentic, you can try Payne Foundow, a 15th Century English recipe from "the Boke of Gode Cookery" for a bread pudding that calls for red wine, honey, and spices such as cubeb and galingale.

If you'd prefer something that might appeal to a more modern palate, try Whitepot Bread and Butter Pudding, which is out of our period as it was published in 1723, but more familiar to our tastes today (http://recipewise.co.uk/whitepot-bread-butter-pudding). When preheating your oven, keep in mind that 180 degrees Celsius is just a little over 350 F.

My favourite version is one that I adapted from the Bon Ton Cafe's recipe. I rarely keep bourbon or whisky in the house, so when I prepared this dish to bring to our annual Grape Stomp 8 years ago, I improvised with what I already had on hand: DeKuyper's Buttershots Schnapps liqueur. I eliminated the raisins and cut back considerably on the sugar, given the sweetness of the schnapps. Gentle readers, I present to you – Bread and Buttershots Pudding!

Bread and Buttershots Pudding

- 8 cups of bread, in 1-inch cubes, left over from last night's SCA dayboard or feast
- 1 qt milk
- 3 eggs
- 1/2 cup sugar (I prefer to leave it out altogether to cut down the sweetness)
- 2 Tbsp vanilla
- 1/4 cup butterscotch schnapps
- 1/4 teaspoon allspice
- 1/4 to 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
- 3 Tbsp butter, melted
- Preheat oven to 350°F.

Mix the milk and butterscotch schnapps in a large mixing bowl and then soak the bread, making sure all liquid is evenly absorbed. In a separate bowl, beat eggs, (sugar – if you really really insist on it), vanilla, and spices together. Gently stir into the bread mixture until all bread is coated. Pour the melted butter into the bottom of a 9x13 inch baking pan, coating the bottom and the sides of the pan well with the butter. Pour the bread in and bake at 350°F for 35-45 minutes, or when the edges begin to pull away from the pan. Serve with Buttershots Sauce.

Buttershots Sauce

- 3 T butter
- ¹/₄ cup sugar
- 1 egg
- $\frac{1}{4}$ cup butterscotch schnapps

In saucepan, whisk egg, sugar and butter. Cook over low heat (do not let it simmer or it will curdle) Stir gently, adding schnapps slowly. When sauce is smooth, remove from heat and drizzle over the bread pudding. Serve immediately.


