Dyeing in the Barony this fall

We have held two dye days this fall. The first one had 15 participants and a great deal of fun was had by all. We started the day out applying mordant to the skeins of wool that everyone brought. We limited the mordant to alum this year. Alum is a very common mordant that has been used for millennium. You can think of the mordant as being the glue that holds the dye onto the fiber. Over the last couple of years I have been collecting wool from various primitive breeds of sheep. This



year I wanted to compare the fleeces from as many of those as possible to the different dyes to see if the breed of sheep made a big difference in the depth of color. We had wool from Icelandic, Jacob, Cotswald, North Ronaldsay, the modern breed Blue Faced Leicester and some mixed breeds. During the second dyeing day we also had Finn, and Merino.

After we applied the mordant we started putting the fiber into the dye pots. Most of the dyes we used this year were added

to pots of water and heated to a simmer that day. This year we mostly focused on mushrooms as dyes. There is not much information about the use of mushrooms for dye in the periods covered by the SCA. There has actually been very little information about mushroom dyeing at all. We had spent a lot of time wandering around in the woods this year looking for mushrooms, and trying to identify them. As new mushrooms hunters, identification was often the hard part, but we had gotten some

We also had one lichen, the Rock Tripe. Three months earlier I had collected the lichen off the forest floor beneath the rocks they were growing on. Lichens grow very slowly and therefore we picked up one that had broken off naturally. The rock tripe had to ferment in ammonia for three months before it was in full color.

I fermented it in a glass jar and watched the color develop from a brick red to the bright fuschia we used on dyeing day. Along with the mushroom we also had an indigo vat, onion skins, black walnuts, weld, butternuts and cochineal.

Over the next four hours we soaked and heated many skeins of wool to get some really great colors. We had colors from the palest yellow from the weld to dark brown from the black walnuts. The rock tripe gave a great bright fuschia and the tender nesting polypore a light violet. Indigo dyes a beautiful blue color most often seen in modern blue jeans. As always a couple of the dyes pots did not work out as we had expected them to. The butternuts this year did not seem to result in the usual dark reddish brown we have seen in previous years, and the blewit only produced a pale beige.



So in the end, I did not see a big difference between the various wools with most of the dyes. However, the cochineal and dyer's polypore had a variety of shades, though it was not the same breed of sheep that was lightest in both. We did gets lots of great colors, and everyone with home with a rainbow of wool.
