# Remning Points

The summer months of 2014 have been busy for many of us. Here is a short recapture of some memories made together with family and friends from the Barony of Smoking Rocks.

After a hiatus from going to Pennsic for about 6 years we took the adventurous trip to Pennsylvania and in effect at least 600 years back in history.

Johannes and I were graciously invited back to camp with our Freehold of River Keep family, in the Serengeti and close to the battle field. We decided to arrive early and set up before war week. Watching the "medieval Town" grow is always so very special. One gets to participate in welcoming old friends and meeting new ones. It is also a

good time to volunteer at Troll and other venues, in preparation for the reason we have all travelled from so many places; the "War" itself.





New this year; volunteering was considered a war point and I recommend it to anyone in the future no matter the extra points. Pennsic could not possibly be run without the help of many and this year again I was amazed at how well things were organized. My personal thanks go out to all folks who make Pennsic possible for us to enjoy. VIVAT!

The weather was not terribly cooperative, at least not at the beginning. This made setting up, parking and other logistics a bit rough at times. One can say that water was definitely not sparse, but most of us accepted nature's fury with patience and good humor. Our home away from home stayed mostly dry and comfortable, and the temperatures within reason so sleeping weather was perfect, in my opinion.

The early mornings before the camp came to life were very peaceful and the big Pennsic skies did not disappoint. Most evenings were spent sitting around the fire pit, watching the embers glow and listening to Master Pat's songs and badger stories. Not much has changed over the years except for the faces present. One of my favorite things about Pennsic is the comraderie and the family atmosphere. I treasure sitting around the large table in the freehold's "long house" sharing time, food and stories with my SCA family. Making new memories that will stay with me as long as I live. As a great honor and surprise to many of us, during war week, we were able to include Master Feral to our camp and help him on his road to healing and recovery. The "Boss" I think enjoyed the love he received, especially the kisses and hugs from the ladies. I saw his eyes sparkle and a slight grin sneak across his face in those moments.

Not all of the Barony's members camp with the Freehold. This affords us the opportunity to visit each other and see areas of the town of Pennsic we might not otherwise see. Transportation was well organized and even folks who had trouble walking long distances had a good chance to travel around. The archery field, I noticed, had since moved from Mount Islin to a beautiful field, way across the other side of the battle field. Behind the highlands, where many families camped in shaded areas. The long and pleasant walk to the archery field offered me much needed exersise





and the reward at the end was worth the time it took. The Archery field offered many a challenging, interesting and fun shoot. The friendly and helpful marshals were ready to help a novice or accommodate a master. The field itself presented as a beautiful, peaceful and most fragrant place to spend a day, while relaxing and watching birds of prey glide high up in the air.

Pennsic University again was packed with uncountable classes in many fields of study. For most of us the choices were not easy. In addition the members of the freehold camp also had the opportunity to take up and learn new arts and science techniques within our camp. Thanks to Sunnifa's leadership as she had plenty to do for us. Local clay from the nearby creek, and reeds she had collected, or brought along from home, were available for us to use.



The opening ceremonies were hampered a bit due to threatening storms and in the end they were held in the large new Barn. The atmosphere was special and exciting with all the groups marching in and declaring the side they would be fighting on. Although our Baron and Baroness were not in attendance a substantial group of Smoking Rock's members carried our Banner, paraded in-front of the rovals and declared our allegiance with the East. New this year, as far as I could tell, the Tuchux also arrived with much fanfare, all rude and stinky as would be expected, to declare

their allegiance.

New and old Merchants kept setting up their tents and ware each day, so much talent, expertise and color all around. The Cooper's big old barn, which had been used in the past for parties and just to sit and rest, is now a larger store with the old space only used for selling ice. There were again many restaurants with delicious food, set up around the barn, and on the other side from Troll, near Pennsic University and mystic cafe.

The Performing arts tents and stage, still located in the same places as in the past, offered a busy schedule. There was a fools school; the world childrens choir; other children's activities; known world choir and players; middle eastern dance and much more. Additionally there were plenty individual and group performances held throughout the town. To many's great surprise and pleasure "Wolgemut", although not initially scheduled to appear, did make a surprise appearance after all.

There were plenty of activities for the children in and outside the freehold camp. Youth boffer fighting was again scheduled throughout the war including many other events for the smaller youth. The

largest being the water battle held a the castle in the field, although I did not join the fun hearing the laughter and seeing the kids come back wet and with rosy cheeks told me a good time was had by all.



The freehold fighters were busy working on their armor, shields and weapons during the first week. Once the war horn was blown at the opening ceremonies, they were ready to fight. Sunday the rapier championships started the war week (more details on that tournament in a separate article by Ammalina Taikkizhavi). Monday started with 5 armored field battles; combat archery included but no siege engines. Tuesday the woods battles were cancelled, because of dangerous condition from all the rain, instead the bridge battles took place; combat archers and siege were allowed. Friday the last day of fighting the castle battle was held under perfect weather conditions. The Ladies of the free hold camp, with the help of some of the chil-

dren, were busy throughout the war making sure our fighters were hydrated and their battle wounds tended to. At the closing ceremony the announcement came that the EK had won the war, the war horn was blown for the last time, and off we went to go eat the rest of the well deserved chocolate pudding.

In the end, the time to pack up our memories for another year, came much too fast. Tent stakes came down, canvas dried in the sun and slowly the town grew smaller and smaller. Saturday afternoon all but one of our tents were packed up and the caravan was ready to move back into the current century, to a hotel with a pool, real showers and some good food before we headed back to our homes in all different directions.

Thank you friends for a fine Pennsic and unforgettable memories.

## Fencing at Pennsic 43



Our Barony as well as our neighbors in Bridge were represented on the rapier field this Pennsic 43 by his Excellencies Eloi and Fergus, Jeff, Aesa, Dee, Ammalina, & Faelan, making up half of the East Kingdom 3rd division.

The East was outnumbered by roughly 40% by the Midrealm army. Despite being outnumbered, the East was able to diminish the enemy's number down to 11 and 12 fencers by the end of two battles. Unit cohesion was excellent, with Faelan killing many, Ammalina playing the harrier, Jeff and Fergus the ringer

newbies and Dee lasting long into the battles.

Their majesties stated they had not quite realized the prowess of our fencers until this reign. It was said by many that if more heavy fighters did take up the Queen's challenge and join the fencers in battle, our force would have been undeniable.

### A Combat archers tale of Pennsic 43

I don't know the score for each individual battle or the totals for each day, but I can say with out a doubt that the East Kingdom was the victor. I hadn't fought in the heavy list battles since 2008 and because of my physical limitations I stuck with combat archery this year. I shot with a 685 inch pound crossbow, heavy enough so that my target would definitely feel the hit, but not so heavy that I couldn't pull the string back without bending over and latching it with the use of a stirrup. This allowed me to stand up straight when loading and not take my eyes off the enemy line. I started out each day with the Freehold Riverkeep but usually lost them as the battles progressed. They were called on to move to different areas of the battle field wherever and whenever the East Kingdom line needed strengthening or if a difficult assault was about to ensue and a strong presence was necessary. I soon realized that the speed with which they moved was too fast for my disabled footwork to keep up with and I usually ended up fighting where ever a crossbow was needed.

I don't fight like most, if not all, archers do. I get right up on the line and never fall back to safety. It was pointed out to me several times by other archers that I was not supposed to stay up front but to come up only when called upon. I was having such a good day killing the enemy that I disregarded those directions. At the beginning of the



first day I had some difficulty shooting. Either my hand gripping the crossbow was interfering with its flight or my tunic was, in that my bolt ended flipping end over end only to drop at the feet of the enemy combatant. I corrected this after the second or third shot and had considerably better results the rest of my war experience with probably a 75% kill ratio for shoots fired. I am sure this was for two reasons. The first reason was that by the time I got to the line our fighters had significantly reduced the shield wall of the enemy line and I faced a line composed of few shields and therefore mostly unprotected spearmen. I heard it said that the midrealm was perhaps a bit heavy on spears as well. I don't know if that was the case, but it made for easy targets for an archer fighting on the line. And that was the second reason for my rate of kill shots, my targets were usually only ten or fifteen feet away.

Now I've heard the statement that combat archery is a relatively safe and pain free way to fight the war. I suppose it is if one moves around further back from the line and moves up only when called to, and if approached by the enemy, surrenders by holding his weapon up in the air. The most that is expected is a light tap by the enemy to seal the kill. If you fight up at the battle line there are no light taps. I was caught in a charge at least twice and because of my pained feet I could not have pulled back fast enough if I wanted to. I was overrun and knocked to the ground and trampled on both encounters. Usually I was killed by a spearman or swordsman with a heavy blow to the chest or the helmet, never by an enemy archer. I began to think that I might as well have fought sword and shield. At the end of the day my torso was covered with black and blue wounds. My armor had to be repaired several times between battles. What fun I had!

The Freehold Riverkeep was awarded a special banner toward the end of the war for the valiant and essential part it played in winning the war.

### Souterlidekens:

When Fracta Modi began back in 2006 and we were finding music to play I brought in a song by **Jacobus Clemens non Papa** (c. 1510 to 1515 – 1555 or 1556) who was a Netherlands composer of the Renaissance based for most of his life in Flanders. He was especially famous for his settings of the Psalms in Dutch known as the Souterliedekens (metrical rhyming psalms based upon Folksongs of the Low Countries). Marcia Anderson a local early musician and friend gave me this piece, Psalm 31.

Fracta Modi has always loved the beauty of the Psalm and over the years I have investigated finding others he had written. There are 146 Psalms in his book Souterliedekens. Using previously published versions and researching the original manuscripts of many Psalms, I have transcribed them into modern notation.





At a recent event, the autocract of upcoming Musician's Day, asked me to teach a class. This gave me incentive to move along the research and now have a small collection of newly modernized versions of Clemens non Papa's Psalms. I look forward to sharing these beautiful, short pieces with other musicians of the East Kingdom.

### Honey and Saffron Liquer

1 cup honey
1/2 vanilla bean finely chopped
2 cinnamon sticks
10 long black peppercorns
1/4 teaspoon grated nutmeg
pinch of saffron
pinch of lemon zest
750ml bottle of plain vodka.
1/2 cup water.

Put the honey, water, cinnamon, peppercorns, nutmeg and saffron in a sauce pan and heat to a boil. Reduce the heat and simmer for 5 minutes. Take off the heat and add the lemon zest then wait 20 minutes for it to infuse. After that put it back on the burner bringing it up to a hot simmer. Take it off the heat and let it cool completely. Once completely cool add vodka and put it into a sterilized jar and cap it. place jar in a cool dark place for 60 days. Makes 1 liter.
